UK trainer Richard Hughes has slammed the expansion of the evening racing programme."It seems to me when fixture lists are put together the last people thought of are those responsible for the horses who provide the entertainment," he says. Hughes added that trainers don't like evening racing, particularly on a Friday and Saturday, for a number of reasons. "Owners have to pay staff additional expenses if their horse runs at night. If lads get back late they can't ride out first or second lot the next morning. Crucially, as well, most of my staff who travel with horses at the weekends are the ones who, in theory, should be enjoying their weekend off. That would apply to most yards," he mused. He advised owners not to run on Friday evenings.

Mongolian Khan (Holy Roman Emperor-Centafit, by Centaine) was crowned New Zealand Horse of the Year for the second year running at a ceremony at the Langham Hotel in Auckland this past weekend, reports theinformant.co.nz. The triple Gr1 winner, who will commence stud duties at Windsor Park Stud this spring, became the first back-to-back winner of the title since champion mare Seachange in 2006-07 and 2007-08.

Champion South African mare Smart Call leads a huge international contingent among a top class entry of 36 fillies and mares for the Group 1 Kingdom of Bahrain Sun Chariot Stakes run at Newmarket's Rowley Mile Racecourse on Saturday, October 1. Unraced since thrashing many of the best South African horses by three and a half lengths in the J & B Met at Kenilworth in Cape Town back in January, Smart Call is one of 21 foreigntrained entries for this £250,000 one mile contest, which will be the sixth of seven races in the Mile category of the QIPCO British Champions Series.
