The Lateral filly, who was Sporting Post's Best Handicapped, started at 30-1. Zackey won the Apprentice Championship in 2014/15 with 58 winners and rode 70 winners last term.

Good Timing



The NHA have amended the weighing out specifics to state that sectional timing devices need not be placed on the scale. Rule 59.3 states: With the exception of the saddle cloth, skull cap, goggles, blinkers, pacifiers, tongue tie, tongue strap, crop, neck strap, bridle including pricker and noseband, rings, muzzle, sectional timing device and anything worn on the HORSE'S legs or hooves, everything carried or worn by the RIDER and by the HORSE in a RACE shall be included in the RIDER'S weight and shall be put onto the scales by the RIDER when weighing out and when weighing in, and recorded by the clerk of the scales.
