Enable has the chance to become the third two-time winner of the King George VI & Queen Elizabeth QIPCO Stakes and the first this century, following Dahlia (1973 & 1974) and Swain (1997 & 1998). ## Changes

Changes to the Cape racing programme sees the Cape Fillies Guineas moved to the second Saturday in December and the Cape Guineas to the third Saturday in December. This allows three weeks from the Dingaans, which is at the end of November, to optimise Highveld participation in the colts Guineas. The Fillies Mile will also be run three weeks before the Cape Fillies Guineas for the same reason.
